Wards Corner Civic League Minutes

June 20, 2016

WCCL met in Norfolk Fitness and Wellness Center at 6:45PM. President Jim English welcomed guests and led us in the Pledge of Allegiance. In attendance: 23.

Jim announced that a special election would be held on Tuesday, August 23 for our area's representation on Council. The only candidate on the ballot is Martin Thomas, Jr (our WCCL VP). A write in candidate has recently emerged. A letter from our Board and others was sent to the Council asking not to wait until November general elections because WC needs representation now as Council has their annual retreat in September. We have a newly elected Mayor and Superward official. We need to be at that table. A letter of support was drafted and sent to all CL paid members.

Our invited speaker is Norfolk SPCA ED Rob Blizard, who writes a column most weeks in The Compass. Founded in 1892, now a non-profit, it celebrates its 125th anniversary at the Botanical Gardens on Friday. Rob spoke of the value this animal shelter, a no kill facility, has for our pets, strays, and citizens. His goal is to increase friends' participation, volunteers and to renovate the present building. There are 5 veterinarians (DVM), a dental clinic, available walk in vaccines, TNR cats program and fostering. NSPCA depends on donations.

Due to miscommunication, we missed our Community Police Officer Report and another invited guest from PrimePlus.

Old Business: A copy of the revised bylaws was circulated and a motion was made and seconded to approve these. Discussion ensued: every adult paid member of a household has one vote; add newsletter and member-at-large positions to the Board; omit committee listing because there are none; Nominating committee appointed in November, elected in December and sworn in in January. The Newsletter has to be self-sustaining (from ads). Member Socco Pearson has been active in obtaining more businesses to advertise. He asks that ad rates be increased to \$15/month else an increase in member dues will be needed to pay for printing. He will send the change to the Board. Voting in favor to adopt the new ByLaws, ayes were unanimous. These will be posted on our web.

Ongoing problems with the Arbor Point apartments on Grantham, Timothy and Restmere (shutters, high grass and shrubs, unkempt appearances), will be addressed for us with Nusbaum rental agents by Martin Thomas Jr.

The meeting adjourned for the summer at 810PM.
