# **Wards Corner Civic League Minutes**

February 27, 2017

34 In attendance (more new faces joined!)

After being relocated to another room at the Fitness Center due to scheduling conflict, we began at 6:45pm. We stood and President Scott Gurlinger led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

CRO Officer William Old updated us on the latest crime statistics. Although the month's numbers were seemingly lower as compared to last month, this past week showed an increase in car larcenies, there was also a rape at the back-lot of the RC's club. The club has told police they hope to put up a permanent fence to cut off the back-trail there in hopes of making it less attractive as a dangerous cut through. There is also an ongoing investigation of domestic child abuse 7700 block of Restmere. Officer Old also took commentary and questions for follow up on several burglary and larceny cases and will hopefully have details on those at the next meeting as well.

Our next guest was Anthony Castillo, Manager of the Emergency Communications Center. Located on VA beach Blvd in Norfolk, his people field all emergency AND Police Non-emergency calls (911 and 441-6510). He explained how calls are routed and sorted by their computer system and how information is passed along to Police, Fire & Rescue, and even Marine or State Police as necessary. He noted that 911 locales work together. In these days of cell phones, the only information they get from your cell phone call is your phone number and what "tower" you are near. This sometimes could be across the unseen border between cities, and in instances of Hampton and Portsmouth as they relate to Norfolk's river and bay front areas, even across water sometimes. In those cases, the first question they ask is "where is your emergency?" This is imperative because they may need to route your call to the correct city's emergency center for the fastest response. That led him to an important point. The key to 911 Operators jobs is getting information quickly, and being able to send that information to the field. Depending on the caller's level of anxiety, the conversation may be misconstrued as terse or even rude depending on the call. He clarified that they are compassionate citizens like us that took the time to train on what questions to ask to get the most important information quickly from citizens who are likely having the worst days of their lives. Sometimes in order to accomplish that, they don't always have time to appeal to sensitivity to sacrifice that efficiency. If you're on that call, help everyone by listening and giving the information required to get the fastest and best response. Norfolk's 911 center is the 3<sup>rd</sup> busiest in the state, handling over 550,000 calls in a year. Approximately half of those calls

are emergency, half are non-emergency, and a sprinkling (about 1200 per year) are hang-ups. IMPORTANT!! If you call 911, even if you get a message to hold, DO NOT HANG UP!! They are required to call back every inbound call. More importantly, if they don't reach you on the return call, police are dispatched to check on you. That little bit of patience on your part can save much needed resources.

Next to speak was SW Dawson. He was given the opportunity to speak towards his bid for Commonwealth's Attorney for the City of Norfolk in the upcoming elections. He fielded questions about his expectations of the job, and some of his stances and promises if elected. Information for Mr. Dawson can be found at <a href="https://www.swdawson.com">www.swdawson.com</a>. The Democratic Primaries are June 13<sup>rd</sup>, and the general elections will be in November. WCCL Board will continue to reach out to the other candidates in this election as well to have them come provide their positions and bids for election.

Scott took back the podium, so to speak, to let folks know that the WCCL Board is working on a Spring Social event for everyone to come out and meet the Board and other Wards Corner residents. Share some time together and get to know your neighbors. Keep an eye on the website, <a href="www.wardscorner.com">www.wardscorner.com</a> and posts on Nextdoor as we put information out.

Last up was Norfolk Councilman and Neighbor, Martin Thomas with updates on two items:

-Arbor Point Apartments are being sold to an established property owner out of Charlottes-ville, who specializes in owning and keeping up older apartments. He already owns our good corporate neighbor, Sewell's Park apartments. The owner has stated that after closing on the properties, scheduled at the end of the month, he will begin improvements as quickly as possible.

-The Wards Corner Public Art will be repaired either by FEMA approved funds, or warranty work because the sculpture was supposed to be rated for up to 110mph winds and that level was never reached. More to follow, but it will be back.

Lastly, Martin told us about his Ride Along with the Norfolk Police. From being there for the role call to the actual ride he was very complimentary of our NPD. Martin noted that all the concerns we raise in our Civic League meeting to CRO Officer Old, are passed directly to the patrols covering Wards Corner so that they are watching out for everything that they can. Our NPD is working for us, as soon as they are in uniform and do a whole lot with sometimes very little information.


Questions were asked regarding the flooding issues on 500 block of Burleigh, and it was noted that
